

A quick summary of the meeting:

- The club is in a reasonable financial state with events and memberships raising around \$4,000 net. Our Rally costs were subsidised by close to \$1,500 from Clinics, Raffles, and Fund raising.
- Thanks to Helen Sharp we received \$3,300 from the Woori Yallock District Community Bank to be used to purchase obstacles that meet the international WE competition standards.

- The Committee from last year has been re-elected with minor rearrangements in roles.

NEW FINANCIAL YEAR

You will also need to bring your **GREEN** membership card to be stamped for the new year. You will not be able to ride or compete unless your cards have been officially signed and stamped.

Amongst the forms there is a member emergency information form. This only needs to be filled out and returned if any of the information required on the form has changed since you filled out the last one ie- new address, phone number, etc.

THE CARNIVAL IS OVER – WEYV OPEN COMPETITION

I think I can safely say that our 1st Open competition, AND the first one in Victoria I might add, was a huge success. We even made a small profit but the new committee will get together over a few drinks and analyse whether or not it was worth all the effort!

In saying that it seemed to run like a well-oiled machine with no major hiccups that I know of. Adam's huge show jumping arena looked spectacular with our obstacles in it, and the course rode really well with plenty of room to move, especially for the speed course.

The obstacles were collected from Gruyere on Saturday afternoon and a few of us met at Adams to set up the course for Susie's final scrutinise the next morning. Once that was done we headed down to the sand outdoor arena where we set up the 20x40 Dressage ring. Armed with a long tape and plenty of 'people leg' measurements we finally got it right, put up the cones and chains and the little markers and it also looked great. We left hoping that no storms or wayward animals would come through in the night and mess with our good work!

Next morning I was up at 5am to spruce Dale up. I wanted to get to Adam's by 7am to plait mane and tail there (past experience has decided that this way they stay in for at least half a day!). I wasn't the first to arrive as Frances from Traralgon had arrived shortly before me. She was leaving home about the time I was getting up.

Cath and Morag arrived with all the food required for a good canteen. The call to arms for goodies to sell was well heeded as a plethora of cakes and muffins etc. were on display over the day. The egg and bacon rolls were a sell out as an early option for brekky and the BBQ was kept warm with sausages in bread being popular also. I was also very impressed with Adam's new kitchen facilities, a far cry from what was there last time I was at the indoor. All the mod cons were available, all that is left to do is connect the water and they're done. His new stables have also been done and are a feast to a horse persons eyes (drool).

The weather was very pleasant for the start of the Dressage that was held outside, but soon got a bit humid later on. Sarah Nickels did a fine job with the judging and was finished pretty well on time I think. There were 17 competitors over 3 levels so she was kept busy all morning. I saw Ben floating around with his camera taking photos of everyone. Rumour has it that he took about 700 pics so there's a good days work involved in culling and sorting the duds from the good ones. Being indoors doesn't help either as at times the light quality for a good photo wasn't the best.

The obstacle course started with our 2 Debutant competitors, Anna and Frances. I saw their speed runs and they both made it look pretty easy. Susie ended up scratching her ride on Alita so she was available to help Margaret with the judging.

The Preliminary section was set to go shortly afterwards. Susie and Margaret did the course walk with the competitors (as with all sections) and I personally found it very informative and interesting and got a better feel of how to ride the course even though I have done it before. I think it also put at ease the few people that had never done WE before. There were 8 people in this section and by this time there were a few spectators that got quite involved and were clapping and cheering after each round which was lovely. A very supportive crowd and this includes fellow competitors as well.

The Introductory group was last but not least. They still did 2 rounds but did the Style twice. Some in this group had a little trouble on the course, mainly due to their inexperience but they all finished and got a great cheer from the crowd.

After all the prizes were given out and the raffle was drawn it was time for the inevitable packup! Those that were left pitched in and the job was done pretty quickly with the obstacles going back to Melrose for the next rally.

A big thank you to all those that put in time and effort to make this such a great day. Although the committee were originally disappointed with a lack of entries, mainly due we think to there being quite a few official HRCAV events on that day in the area, I think it added to the 'homeliness' of the day, the friendliness and camaraderie made for a better competition.

For a small club running the States inaugural 3 Phase WE event I think we did a super job.

Hey Karen, you won't mind a big trench like this some some sin the arena will you? Only kidding this is not one of the obstacles but you never know what you might find on the day.


FUNDRAISING

WE CLINIC by Anna Gust

EDUARDO ALMEIDA CLINIC



We were sent an email from our friend Margaret Anderson of Working Equitation Geelong telling us that we could have the opportunity of having Eduardo Almeida, current world champion in Working Equitation, come to us in the Yarra Valley, if we committed to this within about a week. In order for Eduardo to come, he had to be guaranteed 5 clinics of 3 days each to make it worth him coming all the way from Portugal. This seemed to be too good an opportunity to miss out on.

I quickly got advertising and hoped that I could find the 10 people necessary to secure him for a clinic in the Yarra Valley. As he is not known to any of us this was probably a bit of a leap of faith for many people. However it was well worth it.

We were able to find 10 wonderful riders and horses to attend our clinic. As this was the first time our club has hosted an international instructor/rider it was a big learning curve. We the committee have learnt a lot that will help us to make this a little simpler in future.

I collected Eduardo from Juravon Park in Gisbon, the day before our clinic. This was where he was doing his first clinic in Australia. He was running over time. He then wanted to help pack up all of the equipment. This work ethic came through strongly. He was very generous with his time and effort. He kept telling me "I am here to work." I did discover that he was spending 20 days of his one month annual leave in order to be in Australia with us. I found him to be very humble and self-motivated. On our first day we arrived at Gruyere at 8 am and began our back to back dressage lessons. This was an opportunity for Eduardo to get to know our horses and how we rode. I found it to be quite a traditional style of lesson which began in walk, practiced lateral work (shoulder in, counter shoulder in, traver, renver and half pass) then moved onto the same in trot. We worked on canter and counter canter.

On the second day we set up a variety of obstacles and he coached us through how to do each one correctly. I did not realise that the side pass pole should be done with a shoulder in angle rather than a 90 degree angle. He explained that if you do it at 90 degrees the horse often hits its own feet together. If you do it in a shoulder in position then they can cross their legs. Little tips like this were wonderful. We did a lot of transitions up to obstacles, for example we cantered up to the corridor and then walked in. With all of the transitions I could really feel my horse thinking and waiting for me. We discovered that our Garrocha pole should be 3 metres long. This would make it much easier for those people on tall horses to collect it. It was a day of focussing on each of the obstacles, the corridor, stock yard, slalom, gate, clover leaf barrels, Garrocha, bending poles and backing poles. On our final day the obstacle course that we had practiced the day before was set up like in a competition. The obstacles were numbered and we had to ride the course remembering where to go next. This is much tricker than it seems.

The feedback from the riders was that they really enjoyed themselves and that they would want to do it again if we are lucky enough to get him back during his next year's annual leave. Nadine clinic

A few of our members had the opportunity to participate in a 2 day clinic with Nadine O'Sullivan as the guest instructor.

Nadine is a Legerete teacher, pupil of Phillipe Karl.

The clinic was held at Gruyere indoor and over the 2 days each person had a private lesson each day, working on their own particular problem.

I was on the last lesson of each day and due to work commitments I unfortunately didn't get to see most of the other lessons but by what I heard everyone took home something to work on for next time

For me and Dale personally Nadine quickly sussed out his gait issues and was able to offer some help in getting him to transition into trot from walk without 'skipping' (a long time habit caused through a past injury).

We also did lots of shoulder in, out, counter bend etc to help with same issue and Nadine was very good at explaining where my position should be, and the small details that either make it work, or not!

Shoulder in @ rising trot on straight line (not on a circle) should be done on the 'wrong' diagonal to free up the diagonal that is pushing through.

For the skipping issue, on left rein (near fore is problem leg and opposing off hind) if I neck bend slightly to the right he must ideally load the near fore more when he strikes off into trot. It did the trick but I also need to retrain my brain to ask for the trot that way until it gets better. Also lots of cavaletti on right rein on a bend to stretch that near fore out more.

There was heaps more stuff to work on but I left with brain overload (in a positive way). Need time to soak it all in.

HORSES AND BUSHFIRE INFO NIGHT

Last week I attended an info evening run by the Yarra Valley Equestrian Landcare Group about Horses and bushfires, and they also had a speaker from the CFA Macclesfield talking about large animal rescue (LAR).

The evening started off with a talk about what the best things to do before, during and after a bushfire or grassfire with regards to our horses.

Basically, plan ahead whether to stay or leave, don't wait until the last minute to make your decision. If you have to leave could your horses last up to 5 days without attention after a bushfire scenario as most property owners will not be allowed back into the property until the all clear is given and this could be up to 5 days. Also if you own your property (ie don't agist) do you have a PIC number? This Property Identification Code is vital in the after events of a bushfire as the authorities will check these properties with a PIC first, as they have it known that there are animals registered on that property.

If you do decide to stay or can't take the horses with you for whatever reason it's best to put them in a well grazed paddock, open all <u>internal</u> gates if possible, and in the ideal world there would be a dam for water.

Beware of plastic water troughs and fittings as these will melt in excess heat and remove ALL headgear (including flyveils but a leather headstall is acceptable if absolutely necessary) and rugs. For horse identification your phone number can be sprayed onto the horse with spray paint or use crayon, can also be put on hooves. This is in case the horses stray onto the road or onto other properties as fencing can be lost. Also keep a record of your horses ID with photos/papers on a USB to enable identification and proof of ownership should the horse escape, need veterinary care, or worse!

As far as the CFA goes ensure that your property has adequate access for their trucks (gateways to be at least 4 metres wide, clearance of 4 metres high and a truck length of 23 metres long), check tree clearance over driveway, bridge suitability for heavy vehicles, etc.

They also went through types of horse injuries likely to happen in the event of fire but I won't go into that here.

Then Eric Bast from the Macclesfield CFA gave a talk about LAR, what his brigade are doing in this regard re training and equipment etc.

Maccy CFA, along with Arthurs Creek CFA are, at this stage, the only 2 CFA units trained in LAR. If you need a large animal rescued it is best to call the vet as well as 000 as in most cases the vet will be needed anyway. The vet and CFA work together to do the rescue in the best possible way.

Eric and his crew have started acquiring gear suited to LAR, through donations and have purchased different types of slings, a rescue glide (board) as well other bits and pieces required for a rescue.

As part of your emergency kit throw in an old bra. Why is it so, I hear you ask? They are good for protecting the horse's eyes or for use in cases when the horse requires blind folding for safety reasons.

If you need to call for a LAR best to ring Maccy CFA on 59 688358 or Eric Bast direct on 0419 513050, or ring vet Kurt Enzinger from Elite Equine. He is trained in LAR. For those up around Arthurs Creek area that CFA should be contacted but I don't have their number.

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


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
